
AN EDITORIAL WORD

Know your poetry

Types of Poetry

Lyric- Poetry in which the speaker reveals personal thoughts and feel-

Narrative- Poetry in which the speaker tells a story

Speaker

Like the narrator of a story, the speaker of a poem is the voice that communicates with the reader.

Organization Form the organizing principle that shapes a poem.

Structure- the poem's arrangement of words, lines, and images, as well as ideas

Stanza- A group of lines forming a unit in a poem. The "paragraph" in

Lines- rows of words that may or may not form sentences

Quatrain- a four-lines stanza

Sestet- A six-line stanza

Rhythm and Meter

Rhythm- the pattern of stressed and unstressed syllables in a line of poetry. A poem's rhythm may be regular or irregular.

Meter- is the regular pattern of stressed and unstressed syllables that can establish the rhythm of a poem.

WHY I BECAME A MEMBER OF NMSPS

When friends prompted me to join the NMSPS in 2006, I had the same questions and qualms I imagine others have had: Do I have to be a published poet? Do I have to be voted in? Meet any skill requirements? The answer was always No. I didn't have to be a great poet, a good poet, or a poet at all. All I had to do was to like and support poetry.

At the time, I was four years into early retirement and a bit bored and lonely. I missed the challenging writing I'd done in my career and the company of like-minded colleagues. As a journalism and English major in college (40 years before), I had studied poetry and worked on campus literary magazines and newsletters. In the years since, I'd written a poem now and then, even sold a couple, but I was woefully out of touch with modern poetry.

When I wondered, What's in it for me to be in NMSPS? I wasn't looking for anything tangible. I wanted to do something I loved, keep my brain active, and meet other creative people. The Society offered a place to do that and get up to speed with the poetry of this century.

Where else was I going to find a \$15 (that's what dues were in 2006) workshop that lasted all year? That welcomed me into an egalitarian circle of poets? Would my efforts be valued,

even if they failed? Where I'd expand my network of poetry friends not only locally but also throughout



the USA as a member of the National Federation of State Poetry Societies? (Enrollment in the NFSPS is automatic when you join one of its state affiliates.)

In the 15 years I've been in NMSPS, I've come to realize that our Society, as our parent Federation, is a rareand precious-bird: a group of volunteers willing to share time and talent for the good of poetry itself. Although we give members a forum to advertise their books, events, and classes, we do not focus on the commercial aspects of the poetry world. We subscribe to the mission of the NFSPS, which is the only national poetry entity I know of devoted to nurturing the amateur poet.

First of all, we are a fellowship. Everyone has an equal chance to become a better poet and support each other in the same dream. For me, the rewards have been a life incredibly enriched by poetry and the friends I've made in this community. What you get out of NMSPS depends on what you put into it.

It's that simple.

As I worked on a Master's Degree in English, one semester focused on writing poetry, and for ten weeks, we were required to write two poems in instructor-designated topics and forms. Further instructions were no haikus and to write at least ten lines or more and use our imagination and not name love as love or anger as anger, but to find ways to express emotions without "normal" conventions. I found this daunting at first, I usually rely upon the muse to hit me with a first-line and then dash off a poem —voila! Any change from the self-made format had me quaking in my boots!

However, once I began to relax and write without ego getting in the way. found a broadening of my horizons, writing poetry could do more than express the highs and lows of emotions,

not that those are wrong to express. But there is a delicacy in the poetic forms—purposeful choices of words, placement, stops, starts, italics, vocabulary which delights when it is sought with an inquisitive and playful manner.

I could write with prompts AND enjoy it. Other forms of poetry give a great challenge, and nothing lost, but so much knowledge gained in the trying.

WHAT IS POETRY?

Poetry has certain characteristics that make it special. These include...

- Poetry uses vivid images and descriptive language to 'paint' a picture in the reader's mind.
- Poetry cuts out all the excess words that you might find in prose, creating its magic with a limited amount of text.
- Poetry is normally designed to be read out loud - when you read it, do try to hear it as well.
- Poetry often makes the reader emphasise certain important words, and it usually has a strong rhythm.
- Poetry may rhyme, but it does not have to.
